# **Course Description:**

An overview of the various forms and languages of drawing as both a critical and creative research tool. Activities and projects in each unit offer opportunities to understand and apply drawing as a medium for visual thinking and conceptualization. Related social and gender concerns are investigated to contextualize figurative representations within a broader cultural framework. Students with credit for IART 216, 217 and 218 may not take this course for further credit.

**Note:** This is a **traditional/classical** drawing course based on realistic drawing techniques. This is not a course focusing on anime/comic/animation. Lab exercises and project work will focus on classical drawing theory and practices.

## **Grading Evaluation Criteria:**

# Research Project [25%]

This project involves researching the technical styles of three artists or designers and applying these styles to three drawings of the student's own theme. Additional information will be handed out on week 1.

**Discouraged: Yue Minjun, De Stijl, geometric, anime or abstractionist artists.**We would like you to show us your artist picks on week 2. You may use Bill Reid (field trip) as one of your pieces.

## Mid-Term Portfolio Review [25%]

- In this project, students demonstrate improved perception related to drawing produced in labs from [Weeks 1-6]
- Students will be required to show a minimum of 3 works in progress from Journal project
- Drawings must be contained in package or sketchbook so they can stay together.
- Can be hard copy or digital. You will show them to me- I will not keep them.
- Select your strongest work and date it!
- Grading will be based on evidence of improvement and challenge.

# Journal Project [30%]

The drawing journal is the major project for IAT 208 and is also the end of term deliverable. It will be consist of a minimum of **20 drawings** taking the form a journal, diary, graphic novel, a study of a particular subject, design drawings, advertising sketches, a storyboard or any other approved format, using mark-making (drawing) as the medium. Note: students must gain approval of their theme as soon as possible (week 2) **Certain abstract styles and genres (e.g. Manga, anime4) are not compatible with the classical drawing nature of this course.** 

- Size: Variable (not smaller than letter size)
- Format: Variable: on-line, hard-copy, sketch book, pages assembled in some way for presentation, etc. One page per day is recommended
- Mediums: Variable or combinations: pencil, felt, pen, Conte, pastel, charcoal, string, wire (anything that makes a line)
- Subject Matter/Theme: Follow a consistent (possibly mutating) subject matter for
- 20 consecutive days. By mutating, I mean that you could at examine a different
  aspect of an environment each day or you could focus on a different intense detail of a
  place; the subject matter will relate to your everyday life.
- **Style:** There may be a consistent style although that style may mutate over the course of the journal and emphasis may change.
- **Text:** No text is required except for name and date/time.
- Atmosphere: You might try to convey the atmosphere of the location where the drawings are created.
- Passion: Choose something that you feel passionate about so that you can be interested/involved in this drawing practice.

#### Other Possible Topics:

- Weather; atmosphere (but you will have to relate it to something specific such as an object or location.
- Transit; travel (e.g. Photographs that can be extended into a drawing.)
